

Creeping Buttercup - *Ranunculus repens*



Description

Creeping buttercup is similar in appearance to meadow buttercup with the characteristic 5-petal yellow flower. However, creeping buttercup has stalks that are more angled and grooved leaf than the other. Leaves with 5 toothed lobes are upon hairy stalks, and flowers are out from May to September, ripening to a spiky green fruit head.

The plant grows in rich, moist, neutral to slightly basic soils in woodlands, in particular W7 communities. It also hedgerows, grasslands, mires, fens and gardens.
