

A Letter from the President

The concerns and observations that were raised in last year's review, namely; economic uncertainty; decreased sales of UK timber; and decline in timber prices are all still relevant. Equally, a continued, sector-wide skills and capacity shortage is an ongoing challenge for the current and future forestry workforce.

Despite the above, the forestry sector is working hard to try and meet the rapidly expanding demand for tree planting, sustainable wood products and biodiversity gain. And foresters continue to impress and surprise us all with their ingenuity and creativity in creating solutions to address these challenges.

Forestry still resonates well with the public as a tool to be used to mitigate climate change but care must be taken that productive agricultural land is not taken out of production in favour of forestry. If the respective devolved governments wish to achieve their tree planting targets, it is essential that the necessary skill sets and personnel are available. Education and appropriate funding are key.

In 2023 the Society redoubled its efforts to help support the forestry industries, in particular by increasing the number of year-long traineeships for young people from 7 to 10 a year. We also recruited a Forestry Careers Advisor to help promote forestry careers to children (aged 14+), young adults and those looking to change their career (whatever their age). 2023 also saw the launch of The Green Tree Badge; a new initiative to connect children of all ages (and their families) with the trees in their communities. Please do lend your support to this important new project if you are able.

Divisional meetings were (once again) a central feature of the Society and our mission to share ideas and best practice in forestry. An excellent Whole Society Meeting was ably hosted by the South Eastern Division and the Society's AGM was held in person for the first time since the pandemic. Needless to say that none of this could be achieved without the work of our incredible volunteers, the central support staff, our contractors and ongoing support from you, the Members.






















We are the RFS



2023 saw the expansion of our extremely successful Forestry Roots programme, from eight to ten placements for young trainees. Our incredible members continue to support this programme, with more and more applications to host trainees.

We are delighted to say that we had a record number of applicants for this programme, showing a clear desire from young people to enter and learn more about the forestry sector.

Our membership community, with all their knowledge, skill and experience, are the ones training up young people on the programme. These trainees are benefiting from the opportunity to immerse themselves right in the heart of forestry with our members who care about the quality of our future workforce. All our 'host' members (past and present) are dedicated to mentoring and nurturing the trainees, enabling them to become competent, qualified forestry professionals.

The project forms part of our commitment to taking action to address the recognised skills gap within the industry. There are many people wanting to enter jobs in Forestry but struggling to do so without the relevant experience or training. With a special focus on supporting those that may have experienced barriers to gaining paid employment in our sector, the RFS opens opportunities to a wide range of people from various backgrounds. We are proud that we are a lead on diversity within the sector.

As well as creating a more diverse workforce, we also highlight different routes and roles within the industry. Having previously partnered with roles not just as forestry assistants and trainees, but in communication roles, consultants, arborist, rangers and conservation trainees, as well as forestry workers and woodspeople.

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This project is made possible by the generosity of ALA Green Trust who have been funding this initiative since it's inception in 2018. We are grateful that they understand the importance of the work we do and see the value in these traineeships. Thanks to both our funders and our members, together we are growing a skilled and quality workforce for the future.
